Local Status - Common

A grey bird with black face, black extending to behind eye and upper breast. Migrates north autumn/winter to both inland and coastal areas, returning to the same breeding grounds annually.

Bird Size - 30-36cm.

Food - Insects, berries and other fruit.

Nest style - Small, fragile and shallow saucer shape, building shared by male and female.

Material used - Twigs and grass, bound with cobweb.

Nest Site -Horizontal limb or fork at end of branch, 6-20m high.

Breeding Season & Details - August to February laying 2-3 eggs. Both sexes incubate and feed young.

Habits - Single, pairs or in winter large migratory flocks. Inhabits rainforest, woodlands, orchards, parks and gardens. Migratory and sedentary.
