Royal Spoonbill

(Platalea regia)



Local Status - Uncommon

Status relates only to the relative abundance of species on the Tin Can Bay Foreshore Bird Walk (Photography by Adam Marlow)

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A large white bird of wetland areas. When feeding, it sweeps it's bill from side to side and uses the spoon shape of the bill to sieve food from the water.

Bird Size - 75-80cm

Food - Small fish, aquatic insects, and molluses.

Nest style - A platform with a saucer-shaped hollow.

Material used - Sticks, or a mat of either reeds or rushes.

Nest Site - Branches of a tree growing in or near water at heights of up to twenty metres. Sometimes the matt is placed on trampled down reeds or low bushes in a wetland area. Nests in colonies from a few pairs to large flocks, sometimes with other waterbird species such as egrets.

Breeding Season & Details - Generally October to April, varying to other months, according to rainfall. Two to four eggs are laid once or twice a year.

Habits - In pairs or small flocks, frequenting swamps and shallow reedy sections of lakes, rivers or streams. At times strays into urban ponds.
